

Internship opening: Solar-Wildlife Science Intern 2024

Organizational Overview

Wildlands Network is a nonprofit conservation organization that is committed to reconnecting, restoring and rewilding North America so that life—in all its diversity—can thrive. We have staff in the United States and Mexico working with NGO partners, landowners, elected officials and government agencies to protect, maintain and restore wildlife habitat and movement corridors. Wildlands Network is committed to recruiting, training and retaining talented, diverse and creative staff who are passionate about fulfilling our mission.

Position Description

Wildlands Network uses science-based approaches to study wildlife conservation across North America since 1991. Wildlands Network is continuing a long-term project in the Four Corners Region of Arizona and New Mexico to study solar-wildlife interactions. We are hiring a summer science intern to conduct field surveys, collect, enter and edit data, and generate summary analytics in support of this project.

Principal responsibilities for the term-limited position include assisting with both field and office work aimed at advancing the project's research and outreach efforts. Field work includes monitoring pronghorn via GPS/VHF collars, checking and maintaining up to 100 trail cameras, and conducting walking and visual surveys to document wildlife with an emphasis on pronghorns. Office work entails diverse duties including reviewing and correcting various data sets, creating and revising outreach material, and aiding in the development of project-specific products. Additional responsibilities will also include assisting with maintenance of field equipment and interacting with project partners to provide updates. Travel to 2 project areas will be required with occasional overnight stays.

The ideal applicant will already reside in the Four Corners region within an easy drive to Farmington, New Mexico. The intern will be expected to work from the Farmington office of Wildlands Network or in the field.

The position will pay \$15/hour, with an expectation of a 40-hour work week. The science intern will be supervised by the Senior Wildlife Biologist for the Western Region, also based in Farmington. The position will run from June 1 to August 15 (exact dates open to negotiation).

Desired Qualifications

- 1. Interest in learning wildlife management methods as they pertain to solar-wildlife interactions.
- 2. Undergraduate science degree in wildlife biology, zoology, biology, forestry, environmental science, or closely related field.
- 3. Experience using hand-held GPS or phone apps for navigation and recording waypoints.
- 4. Familiarity with Windows-based computing, and experience with Microsoft Word and Excel (or

- the Google/Mac equivalents).
- 5. Strong organizational skills, and a commitment to reliable, accurate, and efficient handling of scientific data.
- 6. Energetic self-starter, willing to work independently with (at times) minimal supervision.
- 7. Some experience identifying wildlife (training will be provided) and enthusiasm for quickly learning to identify additional wildlife species across the continent. Experience in remote, arid regions during summer conditions.
- 8. Strong curiosity about scientific approaches to wildlife conservation, and eagerness to learn more about this developing field.
